Most of the money has gone into our investment account but a "good chunk" will be used for capitol improvements at Page House, Tapley Hall and the Glen Magna cottage roof. 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The APPLE The PUTNAM RUSSET APPLE was the most popular fruit in Salem Village for one hundred years. Gen. Israel Putnam introduced these fruit trees to Pomfret, Ct. in 1786. Grafts from those trees

were transported to Marietta, Ohio by Israel Putnam III, set by Rufus Putnam, and sold to the Lynd family who remain in the apple growing business today.

NEW CHRISTMAS ORNAMENT FOR 2004

Each year for the past four years, the Danvers Historical Society has chosen a holiday ornament that reflects Danvers History. This year we have chosen to honor the **Putnam Apple** to add to our collection of the Danvers Half-long Carrot, the Onion, the Endicott Pear and the Shoe to honor that town industry.

Through research it was discovered that the Putnam's have been growing apples since around 1648. In his will in 1682, Thomas Putnam leaves to his beloved wife and his son Joseph "all that my farm that I now live on both upland and meadow orchards". Both the "meadow orchard" and the 20th century orchard on the south slope of the hill up to Putnam Lane were within sight of the Thomas Putnam homestead. It is interesting to note that John Putnam, Jr. was sent to the nearby farm of Governor Endecott (now Glen Magna and Endicott Park) "to learn the science of agriculture".

The Putnam Russet Apple was the most popular fruit in Salem Village for about one hundred years. Fourth generation Major General Israel Putnam introduced these fruit trees to Pomfret (now Brooklyn) Connecticut in 1786. Grafts from those trees were transported to Marietta, Ohio 1796 by Israel Putnam III and set by Rufus Putnam who had emigrated there earlier.

Further research took us to the Lynd family who arrived in Ohio from Cookstown, N. Ireland in 1803.




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According to the Lynd family history they purchased apple trees from Rufus Putnam and seven generations later the family remains on the land and in the apple growing business.

The OHIO CULTIVATOR of 8/1/1846 lists 22 varieties of apples then grown in Ohio and places the Putnam Russet Apple at the head of the list in popularity.
